#### **Evangelism in the Ravine**

At the end of the month we took our second trip down into the ravine. God always has a different plan each time so we are never quite sure what will happen. At the first house, the woman said she had faith in Jesus but she seemed a little hesitant to talk with us. We gave her a Bible along with a few tracts and then ended by praying with her. She was happy with everything by the time we said goodbye. Secondly, we met a young lady, Darlin, who said she goes to church and she knows about Jesus but she had never prayed to accept Him as her Savior. We asked if she would like to and she said yes. Dave led her in prayer. We ended our time by giving her ideas of what to do to help her grow in her faith and by giving her a Bible. Please pray for this seed planted to grow deep roots. Our third stop was on the top floor of a house where a group of young ladies had gathered. We asked them about their faith and they all said they had accepted Christ. It turns out they are a dance group who perform in churches in the area. We gave out Bibles and prayed with them. Finally we ended up at our old friend Davidson's house. We have told you before about this young man. He loves to debate about religion and still has not accepted Christ. He does not believe in Heaven or Hell and believes he is god because god lives in him. We shared the truth of the Gospel with him again along with his aunt. She is Catholic and says she believes in Iesus. We gave them a Bible and let Davidson know we are praying for his salvation. We told his aunt about some of the concerns regarding the Catholic faith. #### Pawol Bondye a The Word of God

"All scripture is God-breathed and is used for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the servants of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work."

2 Timothy 3: 16-17

"Take this mountain weight. Take these ocean tears. Hold me through the trial. Come like hope again." (from, "Even When it Hurts," by Hillsong) It's amazing that our God wants to carry the weight of all our trials if we just let Him. He truly is our hope in everything. We can bring our troubles to Him through prayer and reading the Word and He helps us deal with whatever the situation is. He is so faithful to listen to us and will give us answers if we are still and listen to Him. Over the last year and a half many of our trials at EK have had to do with conflicts. First there are those between people here in the home and then there are those for the young adults outside the home (school, etc.). We found out early on our young adults do not always handle conflicts well. They don't possess many skills in this area. It is a shame based culture here in Haiti, meaning people will avoid rather than deal with conflicts. The problem with that is, nothing gets resolved. At the same time we were realizing all of this God, in His infinite wisdom, brought Biblical Counseling into our lives. For those of you who do not know, Biblical Counseling is a very effective type of counseling that can be used with believers in Christ. It discerns desires, thinking and behaviors that God wants to change. In other words, it shows us the root of our problem (usually sin). It then uses the Word of God, by the power of the Holy Spirit, to change those desires, thinking and behaviors into ones that are in one accord with His Word. The Word is the chief diagnosing tool, the remedy and the change agent. We have adapted this practice to life at Espere Kay. When conflicts or issues arise, we follow a three step process. First, we pray to God for the wisdom to show us what the problem is and define it Biblically. Second, we turn to the Word of God for scriptures that apply to the situation. Third, we apply what it says. As a Christian, this process makes so much sense. We shouldn't be surprised by how well it works, after all, this is God's Word. "For the Word of God is alive and active. Sharper than any double-edged sword, it penetrates even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow; it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart." Hebrews 4: 12 The fact is, through God's leading, we were already applying many of the principals of Biblical Counseling before we knew it existed. When Deb started the classes and learned what Biblical Counseling was, it became confirmation from God that we were on the right track. In this month's newsletter, we wanted to share how applying these principles has been working here at EK because it has truly been eye opening and life transforming. It has not only helped the young adults but us in our own walk with Christ. We wish we had known all of this earlier on in life when we were raising our children. We hope it will bless you and your family to learn more. Below we would like to share an example with you of how this all works in applying it to a real life situation.

One of the biggest conflicts we had to face here at EK is disunity. For example, a situation occurred months ago where some of the young adults were angry with each other and refused to forgive. We immediately went to the Word to look up scriptures regarding unity in the body of Christ, how we are commanded to love one another, anger and forgiveness (forgiving others as Christ forgave us). As is so true of many of life's situations, there were some heart conditions in some of the young adults that needed to change. Dave and I then took the scriptures we found and shared them with the group at Bible Study. We discussed the need to apply these Biblical truths to our lives. This in turn led to conviction and conviction turned into forgiveness. We are now able to meet as a group once more and all the young adults are talking and hanging out together as if nothing happened. This is just one small example. It has been amazing to see how lives and hearts can change.
